After School Program is a Hit

Cedar Mountain Middle School/High School implemented an after school clubs/activities program. It is geared at middle school students, giving them a safe place to gather with friends after school doing something productive; however we have many high school students that are participating as well.

A survey was sent to staff explaining the program and asking them for ideas, passions and hobbies that they would be willing to share with a small group after school. The advisor of the club has the flexibility to determine how often the club meets, for how long and how many times. For example, we had an art club that met three times and did

a specific craft for Thanksgiving, and Christmas. We have a cooking club that will meet in January for 6th grade, in February with the 7th grade and in March with the 8th grade. We have a Science Fair club that is meeting every week to prepare for the Science Fair in March. There is an ACT Prep club that meets before school. There is a club for a game called Magic the Gathering, as well as a few other clubs.

We had over 100 students sign up for various activities in grades 6-12. The majority were from the middle school but surprisingly we have around 40 high school students that signed up for a club.

One of the best things to come of this is the sense of community and belonging the students have to the school through these clubs. One student approached me after he saw the sign ups and really wanted to start a Magic the Gathering club. He sent me a link to an organization that gives schools free decks and all the materials to play. I applied for the grant and we were shipped enough materials for 15 students to have their own deck. This club is completely being run and organized by a small group of students that are showing an interest and learning the game. The students in this club have made some friends in each other and are simply enjoying the opportunity to belong. Likewise in

Nurse's Nook



If there's any good news about the effect of soda on your teeth, it's that you can keep the damage in check by drinking soda only rarely and taking measures to protect your teeth any time you

indulge in a serving of the fizzy stuff. Dentists recommend drinking soda only with a meal, since the food will help to absorb and dilute the acid, and using a straw to minimize the soda's contact with your teeth. Always brush your teeth as soon as possible after drinking soda, and if you can't brush right away, drink some water to help wash the sugar and acid away from your teeth.

Of course, once you've swallowed that sip of soda, you'll want to consider its effect on the rest of your body, too. The sugar and calories in regular soda are the most obvious concern, and with good reason. The Center for Science in the Public Interest says that carbonated soft drinks are the single biggest source of calories in the American diet, contributing to weight gain, obesity and Type II diabetes.

Kids who drink soda regularly drink less milk, water and fruit juice, and heavy soft drink consumption is associated with a lower intake of essential vitamins, minerals and dietary fiber. *www.howstuffworks.com*




