

- Red Ribbon Week, a nationally recognized and celebrated week for the purpose of drug prevention and education as well as teaching students the benefits of living a drug free life, was celebrated at school.
- We had "Blue Shirt Day" on Tuesday, October 6th, as part of World Day of Bullying Prevention.
- 74 elementary students had perfect attendance for the first quarter.
- The Elementary School Library received \$762.87 in proceeds from the Scholastic Book Fair.
- The Elementary purchased a new sound system for the Franklin gym. Thanks to Brian Pederson, who donated his Kiss the Catfish proceeds, and the Franklin Lions for their donation.
- Blue Crue Tue (elementary student council) had Mix-It Up at Lunch on November 24.

- What a great turnout for our Elementary Christmas Concert. We need a bigger gym. Thanks to Mrs. Eberhart for giving our students an opportunity to shine.
- 41 students took part in the play The Poisoned Apple, which was presented on November 13-14. Great job!
- The Cedar Mountain/Comfrey volleyball team was awarded the GOLD Academic Award for having a GPA between 3.75 and 4.00.
- The Cedar Mountain FFA chapter has 50 members this year.
- FFA members raised \$2,000 to donate to True Friends camp (formerly called Camp Courage).
- Two Cedar Mountain FFA members, along with FFA Advisor Hannah Wilts, attended the National FFA Convention.
- Students in grade 10 attended the SMSU Career Fair on September 29.
- The Elementary Farmer's Market raised \$3,935 for student field trips.
- American Education Week was celebrated from November 16-20 with activities planned for students and staff to celebrate education in America.
- There was great attendance at the Honor Roll Breakfasts for Middle School and High School students. Middle School/High School teachers and staff did the planning, cooking, and clean up. This was one of the best attended Honor Roll breakfasts I can remember.
- At the November Bloodmobile visit, Cedar Mountain students, staff, and community collected 59 units of blood.
- Cedar Mountain Preschool is four-star Parent Aware certified. This is the highest rating possible.
- The Yellow Ribbon group is open to students in grades 9-12. The Yellow Ribbon committee is students committed to raising awareness of suicide and mental health issues.
- Cedar Mountain Yellow Ribbon students sponsored the Angel Project. The Angel Project provides presents to students of all ages. This year, over 100 gifts were collected.
- Franklin and Morgan Fire Fighters gave tours of the fire hall to our students in preschool and Kindergarten during Fire Safety Week.
- Students have the opportunity to participate in numerous Community Education classes. Classes offered include Youth Football, Cops for Kids, and Dance.

Elementary News

One of the character skills that we teach the children is organization. A couple of the things we do at our school to help kids keep organized

Every child has a "Friday Folder" important notes for the week are sent home on Elementary Principal Fridays in this colored plastic folder. Parents should look at these notes and sign and return

those that are necessary. Friday folders are to be returned every Monday.

- Student work is collected for the week and sent home on Fridays in this same folder. Families should take time during the weekend and look over this work with your child. Have them tell you about what they are learning and which of the papers they enjoyed doing the best. If you see a paper that has several wrong - go over it with them. Conversations like these keep you engaged in your child's learning.
- Students in grades 3-5 have a daily planner. All assignments for the day and messages from the teacher are in this planner. Planners

should be signed by parents each night. If there is homework for the night – be sure it is completed before you sign the planner. If your child has difficulty with the homework or it takes them a long time to complete – it would be a good idea to write a note to the teacher about this in the planner.

- As your children get older, they will have longer projects to complete. Our teachers plan out the project and have certain parts due on certain days. This is partly to teach your child how to budget their time for longer tasks. Be sure to help them stay on track and complete each portion by its deadline.
- If your child is ever going anywhere different after school please send us a note that morning. When kids know the routine for the day - they can be better focused and have less worries throughout the day!

Remember – our children are just learning these skills. They will need your guidance and reminders to be successful! Together we can help our kids learn organizational skills - which will help with learning and help with life- long skills that we need as adults!

### **Cedar Mountain Exploring Daycare Center**

Cedar Mountain School continues to investigate opening a Daycare Center. We have had several interesting meetings with early childhood staff, School Board members and Franklin Economic Development members. Highlights of the discussions have been:

- We recognize that there is an immediate need for Daycare in the Franklin area and are focusing our attention on filling that void. Our intent is not to be in competition with other Daycares, but rather fill a need that is occurring in the community.
- We have had discussions on long range needs and short term needs. Long term, we would like an Early Childhood Center that could house our preschool classes and Daycare. Short term, we need to open a Daycare as soon as possible.



- We have been working with the Franklin Economic Development Corporation and looking at possible sites and low interest financing.
- We will be looking to hire a Daycare Coordinator, teachers and assistants so that we could accept infants through school age students.
- Our hope is that we could be operating by August and realize that this is in the hands of inspectors, licensing agents, etc
- We are excited about the chance to provide more services for our families and look forward to our on going planning!

# CMS Chapter Competes





# **Blood Drive**



# **Nurse's Nook**

# Follow these 5 easy steps to help keep your family clear from catchy infections.

### 1. Get Your Shots

You don't have to get sick. There's a vaccine for many common contagious diseases. Make sure your family is up to date on their vaccinations.

### 2. Wash Your Hands

The CDC calls hand washing a "do-it-yourself vaccine." It's one of the easiest things you can do to stop germs in their tracks. Follow these steps to make sure:

- Wet your hands with clean, running water (warm or cold).
- Use soap. Rub your hands together for 20 seconds about as long as it takes to sing "Happy Birthday" twice
- Rinse. Dry your hands with a clean towel or let them air dry.

### When should you wash your hands?

- · Before, during, and after you prepare food
- · Before you eat
- · Before and after you care for a sick person
- Before and after you treat a cut or wound
- After you use the bathroom or change a child's diaper or clean up after a child who's used the bathroom
- After you blow your nose, cough, or sneeze
- After you touch an animal or its waste
- · After you feed your pet
- After you touch garbage

Don't have soap and water? Use a hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.

### 3. Disinfect High-Touch Areas

 Germs can linger on hard surfaces for hours or days. That's why it's important to keep places like counters, sinks, and faucets clean. You'll also want to wipe down phones, remotes, doorknobs, and light switches often.

### 4. Cover Your Mouth

Keep your germs to yourself. Use a tissue when you cough or sneeze. If you don't have one, use the inside of your elbow.

### 5. Don't Share

- Don't eat or drink after anyone, even family. Don't use each other's lip balm or utensils.
   One of the fastest ways for germs to spread from person to person is by mouth.
- We can't promise you'll never get sick, but follow these basic tips and your odds of catching/spreading illness will go down.



# TRAVEL ABROAD!

Dublin, London, Paris and Normandy

Travel to Europe with experienced local leaders and teachers, who will provide an experience of a lifetime for people of all ages. We will take care of all the planning. All you have to do is find your passport and pack your bags!



After an overnight flight to

Dublin, Ireland, we will dive right in with a tour of the city. The next day, a guided tour will include the Book of Kells at Trinity College and a stop at St. Patrick's Cathedral. Day 4 includes a ferry ride from Dublin to Holyhead, Wales, and a visit to a Welsh castle. Then it's on to London via Stratford, Shakespeare's birthplace. Once in London, our tour includes a guided visit around London, where we will see Big Ben, the Houses of Parliament, Piccadilly Circus, St. Paul's Cathedral, and Westminster Abbey. Buckingham Palace is also on the list, as is the changing of the guards (depending on their schedule). A fish and chips dinner is scheduled for one night and we can see what London theater offers for our second night in London. Next is a Eurostar train ride under the English Channel and our arrival in Paris. In Paris, we will take a tour around the city and have time to visit the Louvre, home of Mona Lisa, and the famous Notre Dame Cathedral. The next day, we will visit Versailles, the famous castle just outside Paris, and see the amazing Eiffel Tower. Our extension takes us to Normandy and the Caen Museum, where Peace is the focus and the stories of war are told. The D-Day landing beaches are a short drive away the next morning, with visits to Point du Hoc and the American Cemetery. Then we will return to Paris for one more night before flying home.

Approximate cost for this 10-day trip is \$4,200 for students (up to age 20 at the time of the trip) and \$4,600 for adults. This includes bus travel to the MSP airport, round-trip airfare and all on-tour transportation, hotels with private bathrooms, breakfast and supper each day, full time tour director once we arrive in Dublin, and daily entrance fees for the activities mentioned.

Students under age 16 must be accompanied by a family member. Be ready for an exciting, full schedule, complete with visits to some amazing historical sites! This is a great trip if you have never traveled abroad before. The trip is scheduled for June 2017.
