

### **Elementary News**

It is bittersweet that I am writing my last article for our newsletter. After 41 years of working at Cedar Mountain, I am retiring. One of the parts that I enjoyed the most of my job was creating the relationships that I made with so many families and children. I am going to miss all of the people that I have contact with daily. And... believe it or not, I am going to especially miss some of those conversations that took place with students and/or parents in the "principal's office"! I don't think I ever was too scary of a principal.... my belief was more to make children learn from their mistakes, get them to do the thinking, and to make a plan to do better the next time. Cedar Mountain kids would know this philosophy as the "fix-it plan" and after filling out a "fix-it plan" form and talking through the situation with me, it often resulted in a phone call home from the principal!

"It's not the mistake that matters. It's how you deal with it, what you learn from it and how you apply that lesson to your life." This is a thought that I shared with many parents. I would assure them that having a noon detention with Mrs.

Machart in elementary school was a far better time to learn from their mistakes than being suspended in high school or having to sit out of an athletic competition for making poor choices!

During my career, I came across a blog on Huffington Post called "10 Common Mistakes Parents Today Make (Me Included)". It is well worth the read and can be applied to all adults that work with children. The author suggests putting more thought into the long term and thinking about what kind of adults do you hope your children will be and then parent/lead with that in mind... what can you do now to help foster that? I have shared these tips throughout my career with staff and parents. I want to share with you a couple of mistakes that were pointed out that we as parents/adults/staff may be making.

- *Mistake: Forgetting our actions speak louder than our words.* How you handle rejection and adversity... how you treat friends and strangers... whether you nag or build up others... children notice these things. And the way you respond gives them permission to act the same. If you want your children to be wonderful, you need to aim for wonderful, too. You need to be the person you hope they'll be.
- *Mistake: Believing your children are perfect.* We all make mistakes. The truth can hurt, but when we listen with an open heart and mind we stand to benefit. We can intervene early before a situation gets out of hand. It's easier to deal with a troubled child than repair a broken adult.
- *Mistake: Underestimating CHARACTER.* If there's one thing I hope to get right in my children, it's their CORE. Character, moral fiber, an inner compass... these things lay the foundation for a happy, healthy future. They matter more than any report card or trophy ever will. I often tell the children, how you act when I am not looking, tells me about your character.

The article concludes by saying: "None of us can force character on our kids, and at age 10 or 15 character won't mean much. Children care about short-term gratification, but we, as parents, know better. We know that what will matter at 25, 30 and 40 is not how far you can throw the football, or whether they made cheerleader, but, how they treat others and what they think of themselves. If we want them to build character, confidence, strength and resilience, we need to let them face adversity and experience the pride that follows when they come out stronger on the other side."

So, in other words, filling out a fix it form is not such a bad experience to go through with Mrs. Machart if you learn from it! I have always said and believed that it takes a village to raise a child. I am so lucky to have worked in these communities that believe in this as well. I am proud to have been the principal at Cedar Mountain for the celebrations and principal office conversations! My dream and hope is that "our children" will be successful and happy in their lives... and that along the way, TOGETHER, we have done a good job raising them to help make that happen!

Many colleges are now offering virtual tours at this time.


#### Scholarship Thank-You Letters \_\_\_\_\_

Scholarship donors are generous and caring people who unselfishly give to support the educational endeavors of students like you. They typically ask for nothing in return, but receiving a well written thank you letter from a student is always special and lets the donor know that his or her scholarship was greatly appreciated. Your letter reminds them why they gave in the first place and often help secure continuing gifts for future students.

Keep letters brief, but make sure to tell the donor(s) about yourself, the impact their generosity has on your education, as well as future goals that are supported by the educational funding that has been provided. Generally, your thank you response should be submitted in paper form, to the individual or organization most instrumental in landing you the award. Follow these guidelines for most scholarship thank you letters.

- Grammar and spelling should be checked and correct it is, after all, an academic award.
- Be genuine and sincere in the tone of your thank you letter.
- Show your personality. The formality remains, but you are now an appreciative recipient, rather than a prospective candidate.
   There is nothing wrong with acknowledging your enthusiasm and excitement about winning the scholarship.
- Submit your letter in a business-type structure, typewritten.
- Above all, convey your message of thanks clearly and somewhat concisely.

#### Why should my child get meningococcal shots?

- Protects against the bacteria that cause meningococcal disease.
- Protects your child from infections of the lining of the brain and spinal cord, as well as bloodstream infections.
- Protects your child from long-term disabilities that often come with surviving meningococcal disease.www.cdc.gov

#### What is Tdap?

Tdap is a combination of three vaccines that protect against tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis.

Tetanus, also called lockjaw, is a disease caused by bacteria that affects the body's muscles and nerves.

Diphtheria is a respiratory disease caused by bacteria that can cause the breathing tube to be blocked.

Pertussis, or whooping cough, is a cough illness that can last for weeks or months. Often thought of as a childhood disease, but anyone of any age can get pertussis www.mn.gov/mdh
